# DRAMATURG'S NOTE

I think it's fair to say that we as a creative team have been thinking a lot about definitions as we've made this show for you.

Let's start with unpacking a simple definition: actor. What does an actor do? Well, they act! Actors become someone else - literally. And isn't that appropriate for this process, where our stellar student actors recorded takes, self-directed their scene Zoom rooms, learned how to light and dress and set themselves to be on laptop-camera acting? Our students have had the chance to completely create new meaning to their jobs as actors, AND still deliver incredible performances.

Let's look to our crew members as another example. Building sets, painting backdrops, sewing costumes, hanging lights: all things that need tactile, hands-on artistry from our student team. How do we redefine crew for a digital space? We have seen master editors come out of the woodworks; graphic designers, budding marketing agents, website builders. It always takes a village to make a show happen, but now the village needs to have an incredibly new skill set. And did they deliver, too.

Another definition- a dramaturg. (Hi! That's me. Nice to meet you.) Perhaps a more unfamiliar word. Dramaturgs work to contextualize the world of a play, making connections between the play, actors, directors, and audiences. They make things like program notes and lobby displays and lead talks before the show. They get the artistic company and the community excited and in touch with the work. I have had to reevaluate my own work significantly, too, for this new world, as have Mrs. Carolan, Mr. Rotondo, Ms. Doherty, and the rest of the staff. But I am definitely better for it.

How would you define theatre? Usually, people say it's people meeting in a space to watch a play or a musical. Obviously that's really oversimplified, because we all know experiencing theatre is so much more than that. We wouldn't be here reading this if theatre wasn't meaningful to us. But over the past months, the question has become: How do you take an art form that relies on gathering and experiencing and communing in person, and translate all of that visceral humanity into a digital space? Theatre is theatre because it does things in such a way that is, in a word, unique; it does things that film and tv can't. Our concept of theatre now demands redefinition for now and the future. How can we redefine theatre, while keeping the core things that make it special?

As we watch a newly-defined piece of theatre, in a newly-defined format, made with immense love by a team with newly-defined responsibilities, may we all be excited for the chance, amid all uncertainty, to redefine ourselves for the better.
